Young reporters making headlines on World Environment Day



The winners of this year's Young Reporters for the Environment (YRE) international competition are announced today, World Environment Day (Sunday, June 5), by the Foundation for Environmental Education (FEE).

Selected by representatives from the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP); United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO); European Environment Agency (EEA); International Institute for Industrial and Environmental Economics (IIIEE); and the Foundation for Environmental Education (FEE), a total of nine articles and five photographs were awarded.

Petr Daniš, FEE Executive Board Member and Chair of the YRE International Jury, said: "It's inspiring to see the results of students connecting with the environment by investigating a local issue and presenting it to the wider community to help create positive change."

The competition is open to students aged 12 to 18 years who report on an environmental problem in their community via print or photography and in some countries video. Nationally, young reporters can participate individually or as a class. Internationally, collaboration between young reporters from different countries is encouraged. Articles and photographs which win or place at the national level may be submitted to the international competition.
